

Volt Luxembourg adds two more candidates for the European elections

Today Volt Luxembourg deposited its list of candidates for the European elections in May 2019. In addition to the four previously announced, Julia Pitterman and Christopher Lilyblad have been elected to complete the list, now consisting of (in alphabetical order):

"The two extra candidates bring huge value to our campaign," says Volt Luxembourg President George Penn.

"Julia has been at the heart of everything that has gone well for Volt Luxembourg in the past few months. She is a change-maker who has brought Volt Luxembourg to the point where we are able to run, who is passionate about our vision for change, and a Franco-Italian who has fallen in love with Luxembourg's multi-culturalism. Clarification regarding signature collection and depositing the list

"Since some weeks back Volt Luxembourg has been collecting signatures for the original list of **four candidates**. We managed to reach the required threshold of 250 signatures and would like to thank everyone involved, both those who have volunteered collecting signatures and those who signed, showing they either believed in our cause and/or in every party's right to participate in the elections," says George Penn.



"However, when the opportunity presented itself to bring on two extra candidates to enter a full list, starting another round of signature collection would not have been possible in order to meet the deadline. Therefore we explored the alternative procedure for entering the elections, namely by acquiring the signature of one Luxembourg Député or MEP, and this proved successful. The list consisting of six candidates that we deposited today was thus not validated through the 250+ signatures collected, but through the signature of one Luxembourg Député."

Fiona Godfrey, 53

Occupation: Secretary-General of a pan-European public health NGO

Nationality: Luxembourgish and British

Languages spoken: English and Luxembourgish

Brief motivation:

"My very first political memory is connected to the EU. I was watching BBC news. The "EEC" was mentioned and I asked my mother what the "EEC" was. She told me it was a peace project to stop war breaking out in Europe again and something that would make it possible for me to go and live, study and work abroad when I was older. This 9 year old was sold – the EEC was the project for me.

I am a perfect marriage of the EU and its member states. I come from a working class family in a poor northern English city. The UK gave me a good state education at school and university level. The EU – through free movement - gave me my German/Chilean husband and family, a fascinating career in EU public health and social mobility. I am living proof of the fact that the EU project can work when member states and the EU share competences and come together to develop policies that benefit not just the economy but individuals.

Unfortunately, due to austerity, Brexit and the rise of populism future success stories like me are threatened. The EU as a peace project doesn't have the same resonance as it did for me as a 9 year old. And 25 year olds on endless internships, zero hour work contracts or no job contract at all don't see or benefit from the opportunities that were available to me.

As the Chair of British Immigrants Living in Luxembourg and the Co-Chair of British in Europe I have spent three years campaigning against Brexit and for EU citizenship rights. I have learned the hard way that we need to reformulate a positive story of what the EU is and what it can be. But I also realise that politicians at the highest levels of the EU don't understand what makes individuals tick, what makes them want to embrace the EU project and what we need to do if the EU is to survive. I think I can help do this and I want to do it, hand in hand with Volt, which is a new and much needed fresh voice in EU politics. I am therefore delighted to be standing as a candidate for Volt in the European Parliament elections." – Fiona Godfrey





Marthe Hoffmann, 23

Occupation: Lawyer specialised in EU competition law

Nationality: Luxembourgish

Languages spoken: Luxembourgish, French, German, English

Brief motivation:

"Growing up in Luxembourg, in the cradle of the EU, I believe that I have benefited from the European venture in a very idiosyncratic way which pushes me to stand up for it now as it is teetering on the edge of a precipice.

My family is from the picturesque village Machtum in the Mosel Region, where I also spent my childhood. My mother tongue is therefore Luxembourgish but I had the chance to complete my education at the European School of Luxembourg in a French-speaking class, which means that I grew up trilingual, among school friends from almost every country in the EU.

This experience forged my truly European identity and drew me to a complete a trilingual Law School Program in France, Germany and the United Kingdom.

However, I am largely unsatisfied with the current framework mainly because it is undemocratic. I am convinced the European Union needs a structural reform which should in the first place aim at creating a European demos. Volt, a dynamic community of Europeans, represents the opportunity for me to actively try to shape the future of the EU in this respect." – Marthe Hoffmann

Brief motivation:

"As a candidate for Volt Luxembourg in the upcoming European elections, I am first and foremost an ambassador for the principles of the Amsterdam Declaration, which offers a bold new vision for a reformed, integrated, and united European Union.
